Krishnagar Women's College is a Govt. Aided College under the University of Kalyani, and follows the syllabus set by the parent university. Within these established academic structures, our college attempts to innovate curricular planning and implements effective curriculum delivery providing holistic development for its girl students. Academic processes are streamlined with the help of University Academic Calendars issued every year, College Academic Plans, Time Tables, Teaching plans and regular Departmental meetings. We also conduct Orientation Programs providing awareness about the Curriculum, Choice Based Credit System, National Education Policy; and also, about teachers and Departments for 1st semester students; add-on and certificate courses for the students; and also, tutorials for students who are lagging in particular subjects.

The teachers regularly and continuously update their knowledge through active involvement in Research and Faculty Development Programs. Even the College authority arranges for such programmes, and encourages faculty participation in seminar and conferences through reimbursement of conference fees. They are also members of various bodies of the University like BOS and other academic bodies contributing to curriculum reviews, assessment and evaluation. ICT provides a perfect Complement to our curricular planning, implementation and intellectual teaching. The college provides technologically enabled infrastructure for all Humanities and Science students making it possible for all students to engage in an appropriate teaching learning process. The Institution has adopted policies for aligning the Indian Knowledge System in all the spheres of academic curriculum--interdisciplinary as well as multi-disciplinary, ICT based and skill-based education intended for the digital empowerment of the young girls. Introduction of a number of Value-Added Courses, commemoration of important days like Yoga Day, Antorjatic Matribhasa Divas, Science Day, interdepartmental seminars aim to promote Indian heritage and diversity in language and culture as envisaged in NEP 2020.

Decentralized and participative management

Decentralization and participation of all the stakeholders in institutional governance is reflected in the policy adopted by the College. The Governing Body is the highest administrative body to formulate strategies and policies for the institutional growth with the Principal at the helm. Principal is empowered to execute academic and other related policies adopted by the Academic Sub-committee and IQAC after approval and ratification by the Governing Body. The IQAC sets the goals, monitors and ensures quality in all the academic and related activities of the institution.

Institutional Perspective Plan with short term and long term goals

Short term plan is framed with focus on academic and infrastructural improvement. Introduction of some vocational and other courses, increase of number of students, emphasis on value –added and skill-based courses, extension and outreach programmes for societal connect, strengthening the Career Counselling Cell for placement of students in Government, semi-government and reputed concerns, MoUS with industries, setting up of Incubation Centre and extension of facilities to students and staff.

Response:

The institutional perspective plan is framed in compliance with the stated vision and mission. It includes a plethora of plan of actions and policies which is formulated after taking into account of the suggestions given by the stakeholders on the developmental issues related to academics, infrastructure, student support and progression, research and consultancy, linkages with industry and NGOs for the employability of the girls. The institutional perspective plan focuses on strengthening the student support system, introducing short term and certificate courses to enhance their employability. The College strives to create an all-inclusive space for students irrespective of caste, creed, religion and their economic status. Augmentation of infrastructure is included in the strategic development plan of the institution. IQAC takes a pivotal role in monitoring and collecting the inputs from the internal and external stakeholders and submits the drafted plan to the Principal for necessary approval from the Governing Body.

Administrative Set-up

The institution administers all its administrative responsibilities through a well-organized administrative set-up, with the Governing Body as the apex body of the administration. It is constituted in strict adherence to the guidelines of the State Government and the affiliating University. The Principal is the Secretary of the Governing Body headed by the President. The Principal is supported and assisted by a good number of statutory and non-statutory bodies, thus promoting an environment of shared work culture. The Organogram of the College is reflective of the entire administrative set-up.

Appointment, Service Rules and Procedures

Recruitment of Assistant Professors in substantive posts including that of the Principal and non-teaching staff, the College is to adhere to the guidelines of UGC, Higher Education Department and College Service Commission, West Bengal. The State Aided College Teachers are recruited by the Higher Education Department and they are guided by the service rules of the department. The Governing Body of the College gives appointment to the Assistant Professors on the recommendation of the College Service Commission. The appointment of the non-teaching staff is, however, rests on the Higher Education Department. Regarding the recruitment of Security Personnel, Hostel Cook, Gardener, Generator Operator, the College appoints them on purely temporary basis after inviting quotations from renowned agencies and necessary sanction from the Governing Body. All necessary procedures for recruitment in the vacant posts of Assistant Professors, Principal and non-teaching staff are followed meticulously for the sake of transparency. The promotion of the faculty members to the next higher scale is done through Career Advancement Scheme as laid down by UGC and endorsed by the Higher Education Department and the affiliating University.

The employees of the institution are guided by the West Bengal Service Security Act, UGC rules and the terms and conditions as laid down by the Higher Education Department. Besides, being an affiliated College, the institution has to adhere to the Statute of the affiliating University. Besides, all the employees have to abide by the Code of Conduct of the College.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The institution has adopted and evolved mechanisms of its own for performance appraisal of the faculty members to ensure transparency and quality in academic and administrative set-up. IQAC has developed strategy for annual performance appraisal for the teachers that helps them keep their records of attendance, number of classes allotted and taken, leave records, participation in Orientation and Refresher Courses, short term courses and workshops, attending seminars and number of paper presentation, publications in renowned journals and their engagement in academic and administrative duties assigned to them from time to time. This yearly appraisal diary is checked and signed by the Principal at the end of each academic session. Feedbacks from the students about the teaching-learning process also provide a quality check. This annual report helps the faculty to prepare and submit the proforma for Performance Based Appraisal System with API score after proper scrutiny by IQAC and screening to the Higher Education Department for the Career Advancement Scheme as introduced by UGC.

Performance of Non-teaching Staff of the College is monitored by the Principal and it is assessed by taking their regular attendance into account. Bio-metric attendance along with the Attendance Register is in place. The feedbacks collected from the students and the guardians are also a strategy evolved to assess their performance in official work.

Being a Grant-in-aid College, the institution has adopted welfare measures for its teaching and non-teaching staff to ensure their well-being and inspite of financial crunch, it always endeavours to extend welfare schemes for the temporary and daily wage-based staff as approved by the Governing Body. The full-time teachers and non-teaching staff are provided with financial, medical and leave facilities as per Government regulations.

- Provision for GPF and easy refundable and non-refundable loan facility from the fund.
- Loan facility from Employees Co-operative Credit Society for both the permanent teaching and non-teaching staff.
- E-Pension facility for the retired staff.
- Provision for gratuity and leave encashment benefit for the retired staff.
- Puja bonus for the permanent non-teaching staff as sanctioned by the Higher Education Department. The College disburses the same amount as festival bonus to the temporary and daily wage-based staff from the College fund.
- Enrolment in the West Bengal Health Scheme for both the teachers and non-teaching staff. Provision for *Swasthya Sathi* Scheme. The schemes provide facilities of cashless treatment and reimbursement.
- Leave facilities extended to the permanent teaching and non-teaching staff include casual leave, earned leave, medical leave, and child care leave.

The institution encourages the faculty members as well as the non-teaching employees to engage themselves in research oriented projects and professional training for the non-teaching employees for skill enhancement.

- Faculty members are allowed to attend Refresher Courses, Orientation Programmes, short term courses and workshops for their career development progression. Resource Persons in seminars/conferences, attend seminars and conferences and present their papers.
- Publication of research oriented papers in reputed journals opens up avenues for their career development progression.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The college operates with a transparent financial system, ensuring the efficient mobilization and utilization of resources and funds from diverse sources, encompassing both government and non-governmental organizations.

Being a grant-in-aid college, the salary of all permanent teaching and non-teaching staff of the Institution is provided by the State Government. Otherwise, the college runs a no-profit no-loss basis charging nominal fees to the students.

Strategic financial management plays a vital role in supporting our educational mission. Prior to each financial year, the Finance Committee and Bursar meticulously prepare annual budgetary allocations in both Recurring and Non-recurring categories, a process ratified by the Governing Body of the college.

The institution has embraced CAS 7.1, a fully automated financial system facilitating seamless management of daily payment receipt accounts and proudly maintaining a cashless office environment where all the receipts and payments are accepted and disbursed through bank transfer.

Our purchase committee, meticulously adhering to tender regulations outlined by the West Bengal Finance Department Government Order, oversees all procurement processes, utilizing either the e-tender portal or by issuing tender notices on the college website.

The majority of the Institution's capital expenditure is sourced from external entities, including governmental and non-governmental agencies, with dedicated teams continually seeking funds and partnership opportunities.

Various committees, such as the Building Committee, spearhead proposals for development grants from the state government for the maintenance and expansion of college infrastructure, proposals of grants for seminars are initiated by corresponding department heads and endorsed by the Research & Development committee and a few special grant proposals are crafted by the principal. The college also explores the opportunity of grants from Private Organisations which they provide as their social responsibility.

All the grant proposals are placed, thoroughly scrutinised and approved by the Governing Body before being forwarded to external bodies.

In addition to fostering financial prudence, the college employs revenue-generation mechanisms through collaborative efforts with external agencies and institutions. For instance, leasing the college garden and establishing a reprographic centre under the Public Private Partnership model contribute to both support services and revenue streams. Furthermore, our infrastructure, including hostel facilities is occasionally shared with other academic institutions resulting in the mutual sharing of recurring expenditures.

To ensure accountability and transparency multi layered financial audits, both internal and external, are conducted regularly.

- The college audit committee meticulously reviews yearly expenditure statements.
- An Internal Auditor appointed annually by the Governing Body, conducts internal audits and identifies areas for enhancement in financial management practices.
- External audits, carried out by auditors appointed by the Department of Higher Education, provide an additional layer of scrutiny.
- Given our state-aided status, we have occasionally undergone the statutory audit conducted by the CAG for the salary and other grants received from the Govt. of West Bengal.

Committed to upholding the highest standards of financial stewardship, our college remains steadfast in supporting our educational mission effectively.
